## Holiday to Enniscorthy, Southern Ireland 27 June – 01 July

Apologies for the delay in sending out this newsletter but we've been enjoying the Ramsey & District U3A holiday in Southern Ireland. Twenty-six members enjoyed a wonderful week staying at Treacy's Hotel, Enniscorthy. We had an early morning start on the Monday as our ferry from Fishguard to Rosslare departed at 11am but our driver, Elaine, from Dews Coaches drove superbly and we all caught up on some of our sleep. The Vikings famously made Waterford their base in Ireland's Ancient East, and our first day was to visit Ireland's oldest city. We enjoyed a tour of the Waterford Crystal factory before joining our guide for a walking tour of the Viking Triangle and learning many historical facts with lots of Irish craic.

Our next day saw us in Avoca, which is a typical Irish Village where the popular BBC series Ballykissangel was filmed. On to the Mount Usher Gardens to enjoy the Tree Trail with over 80 exceptional trees alongside the River Vartry. Such a beautiful relaxing place in which to enjoy superb Irish ice cream.

Our delights didn't stop there as on our last day we visited Kilkenny Castle and the Dunbrody Famine Ship. Kilkenny is a beautiful little town and the day we visited was market day with local food and street food to sample. The castle itself commands a crossing on the River Nore and dominates the town.

We went on to be given a Boarding Ticket for the Dunbrody ship and experienced what it was like as a Steerage passenger in 1846 crossing to Savannah. These ships were called Coffin Ships and for 6 weeks passengers were allowed on deck for no more than one hour a day, in small groups. Death rates commonly reaching 20%.

As well as the lovely places we visited, in true u3a fashion we also enjoyed quizzes on board coach. The Singers & Groups quiz was won by Sheila & Dave Gilbert-Hill, the Sweetie quiz was won by Maureen & Diane Fletcher with the General Knowledge quiz being won by Stuart & Diane Fletcher just one point ahead of Malcolm and Madeleine Jackson.
