Travel news was given by Jane, promoting a new day trip to Grimsthorpe Castle (details overleaf), then Bruce introduced our speaker, Lucy Lewis.

Lucy made us smile with stories of the hidden world of bomb disposal training and how she came to be the UK's first female bomb disposal expert. From joining Sandhurst to rushing to her first bomb disposal call-out, Lucy's story, detailed in her book 'Lighting the Fuse' is full of high stakes and tense situations that for most of us, are beyond comprehension. Her story was humorous and deeply inspirational – joining the military in the 1980s just as women were taking on more dangerous roles, Lucy's every move

was watched and scrutinised. This didn't hold her back as she fought against sexism and achieved something no woman had ever done before.

Lucy's book *Lighting the Fuse* is an eye-opening memoir, that reveals the hidden world of being a woman in the military and how a young woman with an ordinary background, made history – not just once, but twice.

We were then all invited to tea/coffee and a piece of delicious Coronation cake. The monthly display was provided by the Metal Detecting Group.
